#### About the Show

Young, trusting and fragile — Bella Manningham thinks she's losing her mind. In the evenings, she hears strange noises. The sitting room gas lamps dim for no apparent reason. Is Bella's loving relationship with her urbane partner Jack all that it seems?

Patrick Hamilton's 1938 play introduced us to the powerful term we now use to describe an insidious form of deception and manipulation.

This liberating adaptation by Johnna Wright and Patty Jamieson, which world premiered at the 2022 Shaw Festival, is a gripping, reimagined thriller of daring and doubt. Will the 'gaslighting' have its intended dire effect, or will our heroine find the strength to save herself?

With all the hallmarks of Victorian Gothic, refreshed with intriguing new insights, *Gaslight* is a thrilling theatrical experience.

## Psychological Manipulation

Ill-treatment by someone in a position of responsibility, trust or power that harms or could harm health, survival, development or dignity.

The play depicts the enactment and effects of psychological manipulation – the titular 'gaslighting.' This abuse is gendered, occurring between a husband and wife, and is set in a domestic space. This occurs in a time period where there was little understanding or justice around those involved in coercive control.

This manifests in the play through:

- JACK insisting BELLA has done things she has not, leading to her spiralling self-doubt
- JACK's enlisting of ELIZABETH and NANCY in unknowingly or willingly perpetuating this violence
- Denial of blame and distraction of BELLA as she uncovers JACK's motives
- And threatening BELLA with the forced admittance to a psychiatric institution

## There are depictions of this:

In ACT 1 Sc 1, JACK manipulates BELLA into thinking that she cannot trust herself, and culminates in making her think she has hidden a painting, of which she has no recollection. JACK reinforces this narrative with ELIZABETH.

In ACT 1 Sc 2, JACK implements a narrative of hereditary psychosis.

In ACT 1 Sc 3, JACK makes BELLA believe she has hidden her pearl necklace, amongst other items, and leads her to wrongly assigning blame to ELIZABETH and NANCY.

In ACT 1 Sc 5, JACK implements a narrative that BELLA took another woman's bracelet at a dinner party. JACK insinuates committing BELLA to a psychiatric institution, which she overhears.

In ACT 2 Sc 5, JACK threatens BELLA that he will send her to a psychiatric institution as she continues to uncover his motives.

In ACT 2 Sc 6, JACK coerces ELIZABETH into agreeing with his claims around BELLA's behaviour.

In ACT 2 Sc 7, JACK lunges at BELLA. A scuffle ensures. BELLA wields a letter opener as a weapon. JACK chokes BELLA. JACK threatens BELLA with a letter opener. ELIZABETH enters and hits JACK on the head with a cast-iron skillet and he falls to the floor unconscious and alive.

## Suicide / Tendency or Behaviour

The act of deliberately ending one's own life. Ideation, planning or behaviour that indicates this.

In ACT 1 Sc 5, BELLA holds a gun to her head briefly, but does not follow through on any ideation.

There are no depictions of death.
